Forklift Safety Equipment - There are different industries and operations, like for instance agricultural, manufacturing and warehousing which make use of powered industrial trucks including lift trucks or forklift trucks often inside the place of work. Forklift trucks are used to raise or lower stuff or transport items that are stored in containers or on pallets to other locations inside the workplace. These industrial machines aid to enhance productivity at the jobsite by reducing the need for excessive physical handling of objects by workers. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, there are something like twenty thousand severe injuries each year in the United States and roughly 100 fatalities caused by forklift incidents.

There are several types of lift trucks which have various load capacities. These kinds differ for specified maximum weight and forward center of gravity where a load is concerned. Worker injuries frequently happen as a result from forklift overturn, crushing incidents, collision with pedestrians or falls from the forklift. Operator falls can take place as the employee descends or ascends into the driver cab or becomes ejected from the machine in the event of an incident or a collision. Lift trucks could overturn because of being overloaded, or having an unequal center or gravity of the cargo or traveling over an uneven surface which can cause the vehicle to topple over. It is significant for other co-workers to observe strict safety measures when working near the lift truck. Without ample safety measures, pedestrian co-workers are at risk from collisions or accidents connected with an unsafe load.

In relation to lift truck maintenance, operation and training, there are strict standards and training to be followed. Like for example, individuals who are under 18 years old and are in non-agricultural businesses are allowed to not operate a forklift truck. It is required that all lift truck operators should have undergone both theoretical and practical training previous to commencing forklift operation and they are even required to take refresher courses.

The standards that are defined in the "American National Standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, ANSI B56.1-1969 are what powered industrial trucks need to comply with. The particular OSHA standards which employees and employers have to follow as stated in the General Industry Standards comprise 1910.178 "Powered industrial trucks", and standards for Marine Terminals 29 CFR 1917 Subpart C, "Cargo handling gear and equipment" and Long shoring 29 CFR 1918 Subpart G, "Cargo handling gear and equipment other than ship's gear.

It is likewise important for employers know the various other directives and regulations. The NIOSH and OSHA regulations both outline for the employees and employers to all the regulations which apply.
